This document provides a standard of Specification and Proficiency, to which all members of the API aspire, but they do not constitute absolute standards, which override the test of reasonableness, nor do they supersede a reasonable interpretation of the specification and terms of contract, applying to each contract.

THE ASSOCIATION OF PLAY INDUSTRIES (API)

What is the Association of Play Industries (API)?

- The UK Trade Association representing manufacturers, suppliers and installers of playground equipment and playground surfacing.
- API members collectively represent over 75% of the industry sales within the UK.
- The API was founded in 1984
- The API is a founder member of the European Play Equipment Manufacturers Association (EPEMA), which was founded in 1995.

What are the API's aims?

- To improve the quality of play, play equipment and surfacing by working to a Code of Practice.
- To promote playground safety.
- To assist in the development of British and European Standards and to ensure that all API member companies fully comply with the relevant standards.
- To gather industry statistics and market information.
- To act as the authoritative spokesman for the industry.

The API's role in British and European Standards

- The API strongly supports the concept of British and European standards for playground equipment and playground surfacing.
- The API is well represented on all committees discussing standards.
- The API can provide practical information and advice on the interpretation of all relevant play standards.

The API Guide to Outdoor Play Area Installation

API STANDARD FORM OF CONTRACT:

In the absence of a contract document between client and member contractor, an API draft form of contract, for the installation of Play Equipment and provision of Rubber and Loose Fill Impact Absorbing Surfaces, is available for the API Secretariat.

API Guide to the PROVISION of RUBBER and LOOSE FILL IMPACT ABSORBING SURFACES

The API Guide to the Provision of Rubber and Loose Fill Impact Absorbing Surfaces, which should be used in conjunction with this Guide, is available from the API Secretariat.

1. Site Security

All Members will:

Carry out a written risk assessment for all works to identify and consider site security with regard to public access to working areas – this may mean enclosure with fencing to comply as a minimum with The Health & Safety Executive GS7 / HS(G)151 specification. (HSE Books, 1997, ISBN 0 7176 1148 5)

Where more than one contractor, or a main contractor and sub-contractor are involved on a site, the API member will clarify which contractor is responsible for site security. The ultimate responsibility for the play area site security rests with the play area installation company.

Working areas for repairs to be clearly guarded to prevent public access.

High visibility markings to be used where appropriate.

Warning notices to be displayed, including a telephone contact number.

Lighting to be provided where necessary should a clear risk of nighttime injury be apparent.

2. Site Welfare Facilities

All Members will:

On all sites which will be under construction (or repair) for more than 2 consecutive working days provide a portable toilet if no existing public facility is available within reasonable walking distance.

Make arrangements to regularly service and clean portable toilets (if hired this would be part of the hire contract).

On all sites, provide hand-cleansing facilities regardless of the length of the working period. (This can be chemical cleansing and would normally be carried within the installation team vehicles.)

Provide all site teams with a mobile telephone.

Ensure all site teams are provided with a First Aid Kit and instructions for use.

It is recommended that:

All installation teams are equipped with their own portable mobile toilet particularly where the work is regularly of short duration.

3. Installer Knowledge

All Members will:

Ensure that the installation team is lead by a competent person with at least the following play area knowledge:

- a. Of current EN 1176 parts 1-7 recommendations including - installation, free space, falling space, clearances, entrapments and levels.
- b. Of construction details for equipment including - installation instructions, special tool requirements, data sheets and equipment weights etc.
- c. Of Health & Safety requirements for the work.
- d. Of Risk Assessment for the work including - the protection of the workforce and the public from site traffic, dust, fumes and noise etc.

Ensure that the installation team has sufficient knowledge to create a suitable work environment to ensure that risk to the public and especially children are minimised.

Ensure that the installation team is fully informed of all details of the work including –

- site and equipment locations
- full list of equipment and /or surfaces to be installed
- manufacturer’s installation instructions
- size and weight of the components of the structures (to allow the team to correctly establish the manual handling risk and make available mechanised lifting equipment if necessary)
- drawings of layouts with written measurements where possible
- locations of underground and overhead services
- approved access routes
- agreed working hours
- delivery and vehicle movement restrictions
- site specific requirements or restrictions (these could include use of radios, waste disposal frequency, clothing requirements etc.)
- site specific risk assessments
- site specific method statements
- client and contact details
- main contract details that affect the play area works

4. Installation Standards

All Members will:

Ensure that all installations are carried out in accordance with the manufacturer's installation instructions. Where the client's instructions differ from the manufacturer's instructions, the installer will bring this to the client's notice and ask for written instruction to work other than to the manufacturer's specification.

All installations to be carried out to the relevant standards EN 1176 as a minimum. Should the client instructions indicate otherwise, the variance to be brought to the client's notice by the installer and written confirmation required to proceed other than to standards.

The installation of impact absorbing surfaces shall as a minimum conform to the "API Guide for the Installation of Rubber & Loose Fill Impact Absorbing Surfaces".

5. Health & Safety

All Members will:

Ensure that competent and trained personnel carry out all installations. The following will be set in place before work on site commences.

- Health & Safety policy covering installation and site based works.
- Risk Assessments to cover all aspects of the works.
- Method statements.
- Operator licences for all plant used including hand tools such as disc cutters, chainsaws etc.
- Regular certified testing of powered hand tools, laser equipment and all electrical equipment.
- Regular recorded maintenance of all plant & machinery.
- Regular Health & Safety general training
- First aid training and qualifications.
- Provision of personal protective equipment such as protective footwear, hard hats, gloves, breathing and ear protection, high visibility clothing and other equipment as necessary for the task in hand.
- Information and COSHH assessments on chemicals to be used.

Will prepare an installation works programme where required which will indicate the order in which all aspects of the work will be completed particularly with regard to the hazards to children of play area construction.

Ensure that the installation team is made aware of all site rules and regulations that are part of the main contract where applicable. (Besides obvious Health & Safety issues this could include for example – use of radios, waste disposal frequency, clothing requirements, access routes, working hours, etc.)

It is recommended that:

- Members will make site teams aware of the need and encourage the use of protective sun and skin creams.

6. Construction (Design & Management) Regulations 1974

All Members will:

Ensure that any site, which qualifies by virtue of time (in excess of 30 working days), manpower (in excess of 4 personnel working on site at any time) or type of work especially demolition, will be operated fully under the C (D & M) regulations. It is the installer's responsibility to notify the client before commencing work if they regard the works as qualifying.

A site may be a single site, or a number of sites carried out under a single contract.

The site may also be notified as qualifying by the client, designer or the main contractor.

Where the installer is also the Main Contractor, he will take on all responsibility as outlined in the regulations, including writing the Main Contractors portion of the scheme Health & Safety plan and the full site induction and supervision of all sub-contractors.

It is probable that the Main Contractor will also provide all site security and welfare aspects. However it is the responsibility of the installer to clarify exactly what is provided on site, and to ensure that all play area works are carried out in accordance with this guide as a minimum.

The sub-contractors will also be required to provide documentation for their aspect of the works to the scheme Health & Safety plan.

Where the installer is a sub-contractor, he will provide all documentation as required by the main contractor and will carry out all health and safety instructions issued by the main contractor.

7. Insurance

All members will ensure that they make their Insurers aware that the work undertaken is specifically for children's playgrounds and equipment and that they carry the following insurance:

- (a) Employers Liability of a minimum of £10,000,000 for any one occurrence, or series of occurrences, arising from one event. This is the minimum required by law.
- (b) Public Liability of at least £2,000,000 for each and every loss and unlimited in the aggregate for any one period of Insurance. An option should be obtained to increase this cover to £5,000,000 or higher should the individual contract require. The policy should include vicarious liability for any subcontractors.
- (c) Products Liability of at least £2,000,000 for each and every loss and in the aggregate for any one period of Insurance. Cover should be maintained to at least the same level as the Public Liability cover and should be with the same insurer to avoid gaps in cover.
- (d) Third Party Motor Insurance as a minimum for vehicles registered for road use.

Members involved in the design of equipment should ensure that they carry the following insurance in addition to (a) to (d) above.

- (e) Professional Indemnity of no less than the Public Liability limit for each and every loss and in the aggregate for any one period of insurance.

Members involved in the installation of equipment should ensure that they carry the following insurance in addition to (a) to (d) above.

- (f) Contractors All Risks Insurance to cover property on or adjacent to the site that is owned by or hired to you and also includes the actual installation. This cover should be linked to the Public Liability cover and will include Liability in respect of hired in plant and the driver of such plant.

This information is intended to provide a guide only and reference in respect of insurance requirements should be made to each specific contract as terms and conditions will vary depending on the other party.

For further information reference should be made to your usual insurance advisor or to the Sports Industries Federation Risk Services.

8. Contact Details

All Members will:

Ensure that the installation team is provided with details of the client (and line of clients where a scheme is sub-contracted) with names and contact numbers.

Ensure that the installation team refers all relevant enquires from the general public to the client.

Ensure that the installation team will carry identification whilst on site.

9. General Points

All Members will:

Ensure that where personnel work continuously for one employer, and are regarded by the Inland Revenue as employees, these personnel are fully employed PAYE staff of the employer entitled to full employment rights as an employee.

Ensure that all installers will hold construction industry tax exemption documents as per current legislation or be liable to deduction of tax at source as directed by the Inland Revenue. Should an installer not possess either a registration card (CIS 4), or a Tax Certificate (CIS 5 or CIS 6) they will not be paid after 1 August 1999.

Where the turnover of the Installation Company warrants, the company will be VAT registered.
